

Flathead County Entomology Club is Open for Enrollment



“What does 4-H mean to me and my community?”

Cortnee Anello - Age: 12

Have your parents ever said to you, “You need more responsibility in your life?” That is what my parents used to say to me until I joined 4-H. 4-H has become a huge part of my life. I learned to be a more responsible person because I have animals to take care of, I am a mentor to clover buds, and winning isn’t everything.

Sheep brought me more responsibility than you can believe. When I was nine I got a sheep and named him Simon. He was a good first year sheep. He was nice and relaxed. I was still sad to let him go. I liked walking him. He would follow me around like a puppy dog. He brought me a ton of responsibility. I hated waking up at first. Next sheep I had was blackie(sic). She barely made it above weight level. The weight was one hundred and ten, she weighted one hundred and eleven. I was so happy when that number came on the scale. Then my last year’s sheep was Oswald. He was huge. We did so good at showing that it didn’t matter what we got at the end. I walked him every morning to build muscle and train him for showing.

Secondly is being a good model to the younger kids. At the meetings for example instead of being shy, don’t be afraid of what other people might think. The littler kids should be in the discussion too. It makes them feel good about themselves. Nothing feels better than seeing that smile on their face. Also you can inspire them to be bold and do projects in 4-H. You can inspire your younger brother or sister to do 4-h. I inspired my little brother to do 4-h and this is his first year. He gets to take sheep just like me. It feels good to have a sibling looking up to you. You are the older one that they ask questions. It feels so nice to be the one being looked up to.

The last thing is even if you don’t win a prize you still are a winner. That’s what I say to myself and I keep a bright smile pinned to my face. At the fair this year I was really hoping to get grand with my sheep, but I didn’t. I got called back to the champion round. He was a little crazy in the pen but at the end I knew I did well. Also at the fair I was doing the pattern perfectly until it came to the final pivot and my horse spooked and started jumping around everywhere. I was mad at my horse. I didn’t win, but I know what we need to work on.

I believe 4-H has impacted my family and I in ways that maybe aren't common reasons. I am a single mom of 6 beautiful children. As a young married couple, our family started out with all of us being ministers to children and youth in the valley. When I found myself without a husband, falling back into the routine with the kids and church was awkward and frustrating for all of us. I home school all my kids to the 9th grade. So, without the church or many outside activities it was really important for me to find an avenue to let my children build relationships and get some positive feedback.

4-H was a great opportunity because it didn't interfere with busy day work and school. It also added a great opportunity to add curriculum into the school day. Over time, watching my children bond, train, research, care for, and even sometimes send to butcher, their animals has been quite interesting. When children lose a parent many painful scars can be found in their hearts. Love, trust, dealing with loss, it all has to be rebuilt. Sometimes the remaining parent, (me) could not heal my own children because I was just too close to it all. However, learning their strengths, saying goodbye in a positive way to the market animal, and having to work in teams and trust other people has been very healing and amazing for us. The men, who involve themselves, step up, help at the fair and in private clubs, have given my children positive role models and proof that not all men are bad.

Financially you can imagine how hard it is and was for me to do vacations or provide extras for my kids. Even now I work as a Registered Nurse about 65 – 70 hours a week to put food on the table. I still have to visit the food bank sometimes. 4-H offered scholarships when I couldn't pay dues, provide fund raising so my children could do fun things like water parks and pumpkin patches. Our family vacation is the fair. During this time I don't work, which my children LOVE, and we eat funnel cakes, play with friends and compete with our animals. My kids take it very seriously, this is their time to shine and they work all year towards it. My oldest has been the president of her 4-H club now for 2 years. Her growth in people and communication skills is amazing.

My daughter has made over \$5000.00 in the last 2 years with the sale of her steer at the fair. Her younger sister has made over \$2000.00 with her hogs and her little brother will show his first hog this year as well. If it were not for this opportunity, they would not have \$ for a car, clothes, or extra things they wish for but I can't buy.

In short, 4-H is a blessing in so many ways for my family.

I, Sherry Madsen will tell you why 4-H is important to me. Born in Whitefish, Montana in 1950. I grew up on a farm in the Bissell Community 10 miles southwest of Whitefish. Both of my parents Everett Kelch and Edna Dukleth Kelch were in 4-H in Flathead County.

I began 4-H at age 9, as an associate member. I loved 4-H, it was the one thing we enjoyed that wasn't work. I lived on a farm and we milked cows by hand, I started milking at age 7. We had dairy cows, Jersey and Guernsey. They produced more cream which my parents sold to Equity Supply for Ice Cream.

As children we had our own cows that my parents gave us for all the work that we did on the farm. These animals were the first thing we took to the faire for 4-H projects. I always wanted to do more so I raised rabbits, chickens, pigs and cows. My mother wanted me to learn to sew and cook also. I had a horse and I spent a lot of time riding him. I took my horse (Wildfire) as a 4-H project and since we did not have a horse trainer or truck big enough to load him I rode Wildfire 18 miles to Kalispell and after the fair was over 18 miles back home.

I learned in 4-H that if you started a project you had to finish it. I feel this is one of the best lessons I learned in life. I learned to cook and sew my own clothes, canned fruit and vegetables. We always had a garden so that was a 4-H project also.

4-H is an organization a child can learn life skills they can use their entire life. When my children were old enough to join 4-H I got them started. They had a lot of fun and learned the joy of winning and the lesson of disappointment when their pig did not make weight. I then decided to become a leader. This is my 25th year as a leader and the organization leader for our club.

I now have my Grandchildren in 4-H and I teach quilting to our club. I have 65 plus children and they are some of the nicest children around. From these children they will become very productive adults and carry on life skills and experiences with their children one day. Our 4-H children see how important it is not to litter.

Other projects that we are involved in include, and Easter Egg Hunt, decorating cakes for the school cake walk, helping the Fire Department with Christmas cookie trays and food baskets for the Veteran food pantry.




Bunny Pear Salad

4 Servings Prep/Total Time: 15 min.

Ingredients

- Red lettuce leaves
- 1 can (15-1/4 ounces) pear halves, drained
- 12 dried currants or raisins
- 8 whole almonds
- 4 baby carrots
- 4 parsley sprigs
- Whipped cream in a can



Directions

- Arrange lettuce on four salad plates; place a pear half cut side down on each plate.
- For eyes, insert two currants at narrow end of pear; add one currant for nose. For ears, insert almonds upright behind eyes.
- With a sharp knife, cut a small hole at one end of each carrot; insert a parsley sprig for carrot top. Place under bunny's nose.
- For tail, spray a small mound of whipped cream at the wide end of each pear.

Yield: 4 servings. To make this a healthier alternative, substitute low fat cottage cheese for the whipped cream and make sure to use *light* canned pears.
