Summary of Diseases in the State of Montana for Week 7:

- Enteric Diseases: Campylobacteriosis (13), Cryptosporidiosis (2), Giardiasis (1), Salmonellosis (2), Shigellosis (1), Shiga toxin-producing Escherichia coli (STEC) (1)
- General Communicable Diseases: COVID-19 (468), Latent TB Infection (LTBI) (3)
- Heavy Metal Exposures: Lead (3)
- Hepatitis: Hepatitis C, chronic (23)
- **STD/HIV**: Chlamydia (76), Gonorrhea (14), HIV/AIDS (1), Syphilis, congenital (1), Syphilis, primary and secondary (9), Syphilis, latent (5)
- Vaccine Preventable Diseases: Haemophilus influenzae, invasive (1), Influenza, hospitalization or death (23), Pertussis (1), Streptococcus pneumoniae, invasive (6)
- Zoonotic and Vector borne: Rabies, post-exposure prophylaxis (PEP) (1)

Hand, Foot and Mouth Disease (Coxsackie virus)

(HFMD) spreads easily through: Person-to-person contact, droplets made when a person who is sick with HFMD sneezes, coughs, or talks and contact with contaminated surfaces and objects.

Sign and Symptoms:

- Tiny blisters in the mouth and on the fingers,
- · palms of hands, buttocks, and soles of feet
- Fever
- Sore throat
- Runny nose/cough
- · Vomiting and diarrhea may occur
- · Asymptomatic infections may occur

Hand, foot, and mouth disease (HFMD) is very contagious.

You can help prevent catching or spreading HFMD by following simple steps below.

- Wash your hands
- · Avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched surfaces and shared items
