Summary of Diseases in the State of Montana for Week 3:

- Enteric Diseases: Campylobacteriosis (4), Cryptosporidiosis (2), Giardiasis (1), Shiga toxin-producing Escherichia coli (STEC) (1), Salmonellosis (2), Vibriosis (1), Trichinosis (1)
- General Communicable Diseases: COVID-19 (570), Latent TB Infection (LTBI) (3)
- Heavy Metal Exposures: Lead (8)
- **Hepatitis**: Hepatitis C, chronic (17), Hepatitis A, acute (1)
- STD/HIV: Chlamydia (44), Gonorrhea (7), Syphilis, primary and secondary (5), Syphilis, latent (7), Syphilis, congenital (1), HIV/AIDS (1)
- Vaccine Preventable Diseases: Influenza, hospitalization or death (54), Streptococcus pneumoniae, invasive (2), Haemophilus influenzae, invasive (1)
- Zoonotic: Rabies, post-exposure prophylaxis (PEP) (1)

Conjunctivitis (Pink Eye)

Pink eye is spread through person-to-person contact. Its spread through close personal contact with discharges from eyes or by touching surfaces contaminated with infected eye secretions.

Symptoms include:

- Pink or red color in the white of the eye(s)
- Swelling of the conjunctiva and/or eyelids
- Increased tear production
- · Itching, irritation, and/or burning
- · Crusting of the eyelids or lashes, especially in the morning

To prevent the spread, wash your hands with soap and water often. Avoid touching or rubbing your eyes and wash any discharge from around your eye(s). Do not share any personal items such as pillows, washcloths, towels, eye drop or eyeglasses.
